

COALITION COMMUNICATION: LAW ENFORCEMENT

LATEST UPDATES

Due to the ongoing pandemic, Ohio Governor Mike DeWine has signed Ohio House Bill 404, extending the expiration date of driver's licenses, identification cards, and vehicle registrations beyond December 1, 2020. If the expiration date is March 9, 2020, to April 1, 2021, the expiration date has now been automatically extended and will remain valid until **July 1, 2021**. The bill also allows virtual public meetings to continue until the same date.

The Ohio Department of Public Safety and Ohio Department of Health have renewed their agreement that allows names and addresses of COVID-19 positive Ohioans to be accessible to law enforcement through LEADS for law enforcement purposes. The agreement was extended until January 31 to help prevent exposure to first responders, ensure that Ohio maintains capacity to respond to emergencies, and ensure that first responders have the necessary information to take appropriate protective action when necessary. Health information is removed from LEADS 14 days after diagnosis.

Ohio's [positivity rate](#) has reached 15 percent – our highest rate since April. The Ohio Department of Health encourages residents to stay home as much as possible, and if you must be out, wear a mask and follow distancing protocols.

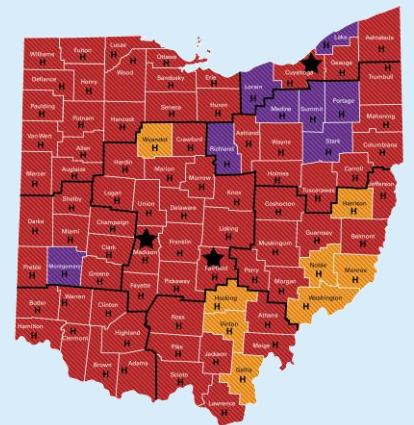
A [statewide curfew](#) remains in effect between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. to help slow down the spread of the virus and to prevent hospitals from reaching capacity/postponing important medical procedures. The order will remain in effect until Dec. 10, however, this order could be extended or modified based on factors such as case and hospitalization trends.

Officers are not expected to pull over individuals who are seen on the roads during the curfew period. The curfew order is a tool available to law enforcement if egregious violations of the order are observed. Violations of the order are a misdemeanor of the second degree (ORC: 3701.352)

New Case Trend




New Hospitalization Trend

TALKING POINTS FOR YOU

To slow the spread of the virus and keep the economy moving, we must all work to reduce our contacts with others as much as possible. Reducing at least one in-person interaction each day will contribute to reducing spread and saving lives.

We depend on Ohio's hospitals to be there for us when we need healthcare – and now our healthcare workers are depending on us to prevent our hospitals from becoming overwhelmed. As COVID patients begin to crowd out non-COVID residents seeking healthcare, many hospitals have already begun to postpone non-emergency surgeries.

Please stay home as much as possible. When you do go out, don't forget your mask and stay at least six feet away from others. Wash your hands often.

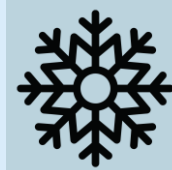

WAYS YOU CAN HELP
